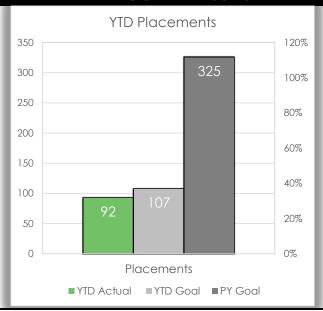

SUCCESS STORIES

Rachael joined workforce development in August 2023. She is a single mother of 2 boys and had recently completed a dental hygienist program and was really struggling financially due to the amount of debt she accrued while in training. Her school loan bills began in September and she is paying around \$1,200/month. She was also homeless before acquiring her current job.

We were able to provide transportation funds and resources for utility support. Her Workforce Specialist (WFS) provided a clothing supportive payment for each of her children to ease the stress of back-to-school costs. Her WFS also worked with her on a vehicle repair request to help her while she was attempting to relieve the debt she accrued.

Due to the support, transportation and bonus funds, Rachael was able to complete a dental hygienist training and soon after that, obtained a job with Heartland Dental making \$58/hour (full-time). Rachael has now been able to pay down more of her debt and relieve financial stress. She has stable housing and has been able to purchase new clothing and school supplies for her 2 children. She will be referred to the Post-TANF program for additional support now that her TANF benefits have stopped due to her income level!

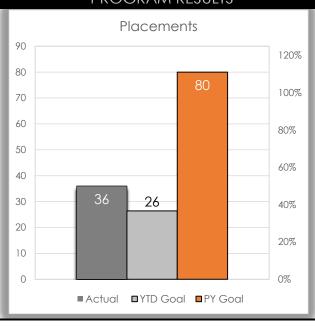

A customer entered the program in December 2021 searching for new employment opportunity. This customer was living off unemployment and was in need of finding a new career pathway to support himself. This sustomer expressed the desire to pursue an entrepreneurial pathway of owning and operating a food truck. He has always loved to cook and work in a kitchen, but due to COVID-19, the food industry business was struggling and this customer lacked the knowledge on how to run a business.

Upon entering the program, this customer was assisted with finding employment in the service indstry and is now able to follow his passion. He was also working on gaining custody of his child. By being able to maintain employment and meet his child support obligations for several consecutive months, not only was he able to contribute \$4,493.36 in child support payments, but recently also gained custody of his child. This resulted in closure of his child support case and therefore early graduation from Parents to Work program.

Congratulations to this customer on a job well done and his dedication to being an involved and loving parent for his child.

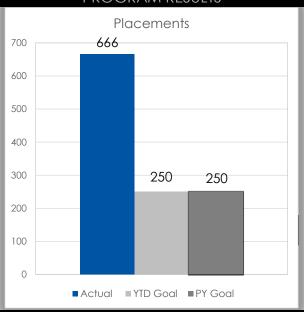

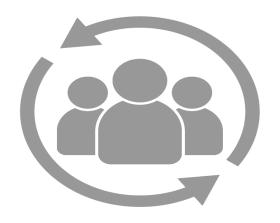

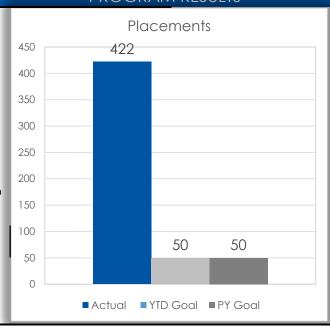

Tyra was referred to Employment First after she was no longer eligible for Colorado Works. She was working on gaining a certification in Data Analytics through Grow with Google when she transitioned to Employment First. Tyra was also working full time, but not able to cover her basic needs with her income. She needed support with finding full-time work at a higher wage that would allow her to cover her household expenses and work with her daughter's childcare schedule.

Tyra was connected with a scholarship program that allowed her to continue her participation with Grow with Google towards her certification. She was also provided with resources for resume building and job opportunities. She received support with clothing for interviews, transportation, and connection to resources like Affordable Connectivity Pro. Tyra was able to complete her certification with Grow with Google and recently gained full-time work at a permanent position making \$22.50/hour!

Tyra in her final month of job retention and is receiving the tools she needs to work successfully in a hybrid schedule!

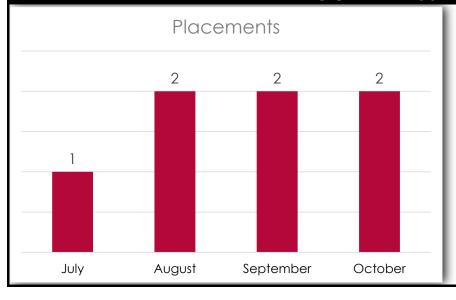

Luke is a teenager who lives with his mother and 3 younger siblings. Due to needing to help his family financially, Luke has consistently had to balance school and work. Most of his work experience has been in the restaurant industry. Luke started participating in the Douglas County Youth Employment Program (DCYEP) hoping to find support for reaching his long-term goal of owning a restaurant that serves either Italian or Mexican food. Luke worked with his Workforce Specialist to outline the steps needed to help him reach his long-term goal. After learning more about Luke's aspirations, his Workforce Specialist partnered with the Work-based Learning team at Arapahoe/Douglas Works! to find out more about options for Luke to gain relevant experience and was presented with information about an opportunity with the Restaurant Youth Registered Apprenticeship (RYRA). The Workforce Specialist coordinated a meeting between Luke and his mother and the RYRA program manager. DCYEP also supported Luke with transportation assistance and program incentives. After attending an orientation session, Luke started a registered pre-apprenticeship with RYRA. Luke will take online food safet+A1y and preparation courses to earn industry certifications through RYRA until he is able to start an on-site apprenticeship. When Luke turns 18, he will then be ready and eligible to start a registered apprenticeship with a local restaurant where he will continue to improve his cooking skills, learn more about restaurant management, and gain the experience needed to help him reach his goal of owning a restaurant in the future. Luke is very excited for this opportunity to set him on a path to a stable career that he will love.
